**Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B – Mark):** The final week of the school year is just around the corner, the long summer holiday is about to start. The people of Galilee in Jesus’ day did not have the luxury of much free time, to say nothing of a prolonged holiday away from home. Today, however, we meet them in large numbers in pursuit of Jesus and his disciples, so they must have set down tools or left their homes at least for an afternoon. They were making time for God, they were hot in pursuit of the young prophet from Nazareth and his associates. Those latter, the disciples, had just returned from a tour of the province preaching the Good News and passing on to others the teaching they had learned from Jesus. It may well be that it was on account of the impact they made on this local missionary journey – a dry run for the longer and more arduous missionary expeditions on which they would later embark – that so many people set out to find Jesus and spend time in his company. The people of Galilee may have had little spare time yet Mark suggests to us that what free time they had they used to get to know Jesus better. It was not curiosity about God’s word that drove them however, it was the needs that preoccupied them, the problems they encountered in day-to-day life and which they felt Jesus might be able to solve. He must have seen just how needy they were. Mark tells us “*he took pity on them*”. We have more spare time and the holiday season, particularly the summer, reminds us of just how much free time we have. The scripture readings this weekend, both the words of the prophet Jeremiah in the OT and the account Mark provides of Jesus’ encounter with the crowd, remind us that our needs also matter. Perhaps the summer holiday allows us an opportunity to reflect further on them and confide them to the Lord. We must not feel guilty about our holiday! Mark tells us how curious Jesus was to hear what his disciples had to tell him after their return from their missionary journey but how insistent he was that they should “*rest for a while*”.

**First Reading (OT): Jeremiah 23, 1 – 6:** We find here in this extract from the prophet Jeremiah that same language which is so familiar to us from Psalm 23 – *The Lord is my shepherd* – and which figures later in the NT in so many of the parables of Jesus as well as the description he furnishes of himself as the Good Shepherd which features in the liturgy during Eastertide. The language has also shaped the Church’s understanding of its own relationship with its people as well as the ideal it sets before those who minister, bishops and priests particularly, in a context which is deliberately described as “pastoral”.

**Second Reading (NT): Ephesians 2, 13 -18:** The emphasis here is on the unity which Jesus brought to peoples and communities which heretofore were hostile and divided. The cross restored unity and achieved a peace, beyond all understanding, among peoples who before were enemies. It is worth reflecting on the nature of the peace brought about by Jesus.

**Gospel: Mark 6, 30 – 34:** [The message of the Gospel is contained in the introduction above.]
