First Sunday of Lent (Year C – Luke): Our Lenten resolutions, while not exactly flagging at this early stage, are already being put to the test five days into the penitential season. It is thoughtful of the Church to put the story of Jesus' temptations before us each year on the first Sunday of the new season. This is not just a concession to our feeble humanity and our personal susceptibility to temptation put to a particular test during Lent. It is intended to make us think not only about Jesus and his struggle but to help us to realise that the history of God's people from Adam and Eve to the present day involves a similar story. The essence of the temptation of Jesus was the idea that he could go it alone, that he could be entirely self-sufficient. Jesus resisted this because he recognised his complete dependence on the Father. He knew that he needed to be nourished by God's word and that his true identity lay in seeking to do his Father's will. When Satan succeeds in convincing us that we have it in our power to save ourselves then we are on the path to self-destruction. Lent is a time for us to humbly take God's hand and to walk the path of faith and love that leads to Easter. Through our parish Lent Course we can deepen our knowledge of what it is in faith we believe.

First Reading (OT): Deuteronomy 26, 4 – 10: Deuteronomy recounts the events of the Exodus and the giving of the Law on Mt. Sinai, and it is done in the form of Moses' last will and testament. The text for today is taken from that part when Moses is instructing the people how they should offer thanksgiving to God after their first harvest in the Promised Land which they are about to enter. The short ritual which he asks them to perform makes it abundantly clear that the Israelites are to derive their identity from their covenant relationship with God. This is the God who guided their ancestors from the time of Abraham and Joseph and who freed them from their misery, toil and oppression in Egypt. It is this same God who has brought them to this land whose fruits they are about to enjoy. The people, for their part, are to show their fidelity to God by living as he has asked them, walking the ways of justice and mercy that are enshrined in the Torah (the Law of Israel).

Second Reading (NT): Romans 10, 8 – 13: Something which caused Paul great anxiety during his life was the fact that his own people (i.e. the Jews) had not accepted Jesus as Saviour. In this extract from his letter to the early Christians of Rome, Paul readily admits that his former co-religionists have great fervour but he argues it is misplaced. He is of the view that, instead of trusting themselves to the saving justice of God, they have instead created a justice based on their own observance of the Law. He argues however that the OT prepares the way for faith in Jesus but that rigorous observance of it may get in the way of following Jesus.

Gospel: Luke 4, 1 – 13: Luke introduces the Spirit into his temptation story. It was the Spirit which drove Jesus into the desert and it was inspiration from the Spirit that helped him resist the temptations. Perhaps, especially during Lent, as we are tempted, we too might turn to the Spirit to assist us.
