


# Parish of Our Lady & St. Anne, Caversham

**Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A – Matthew):** Our collective past is never very far away, even if in terms of years the moments that cause us most difficulty in recollecting them are receding and taking on different contours in the human memory. Recent weeks have seen commemorations of the Holocaust, of the liberation of the concentration camp of Auschwitz and shortly we will be marking the seventy-fifth anniversary of the carpet-bombing of Dresden as WW II drew to a close. The banality of evil, the awful things of which ordinary people and whole nations are capable, and the enormous achievements of people who allowed themselves to be reconciled present a very complex portrait of the human spirit. We can never calculate over the centuries what influence the Decalogue (i.e. the Ten Commandments) had on moderating or improving human behaviour across the cultures where Judaism and then Christianity held sway. Certainly, even in the multi-cultural society in which we live and in the global village we all inhabit, our judgement of what we constitute “good” and what we find reprehensible and consider “evil” the grid of reference for most of us is still the Ten Commandments. They occupy a central place in the liturgy this Sunday. And the focus, as it was last week, is less on our relationship with God and our duties towards him, than on our complex relationships with one another. At a time when, post-election, all the communities of our British Isles are focusing their attention on issues central to the future profile of these same societies – homelessness, affordability of housing, organised crime, the environment – the attempt by Jesus to drag his disciples out of their comfort zone in today’s Gospel is singularly apposite.

**First Reading (OT): Leviticus 19, 1 – 2. 17 – 18:** The commandment to love one’s neighbour as oneself that we find in the Book of Leviticus refers back to the love that God himself bears his creation. God is himself holy. He loves his creation and gives it directions to guarantee a successful, happy life. The aim is that people, who owe their lives to God, should themselves strive to life according to the standard of holiness they find in God himself.

**Second Reading (NT): 1 Corinthians 3, 16 – 23:** The idea of the person as a temple of God and as inhabited by his Spirit has consequences. Such a dwelling can be inhabited by different and competing spirits. It is Paul’s desire that in the very divided community of Corinth God’s spirit should inhabit hearts and minds. We all know the terrible consequences for individuals, societies and communities (including parish communities) when spirits, some evil and some good, are in competition.

**Gospel: Matthew 5, 38 – 48:** Mahatma Gandhi, not a Christian but someone with immense respect for Jesus, is a startling example from our own time of the pacifist ideals outlined by Jesus in this attempt to encourage people to push the commandments to their outer limit.
