**Seventh Sunday of Easter (Year A – Matthew):** In ascending to God, Jesus entered into glory. The glory he enjoys, seated at the right hand of the Father, is a reality we too will enjoy one day. St. Paul invited us to *cast your minds to the things that are above* and, particularly when it comes to praying for the faithful departed at All Saints and All Souls the Church's liturgy anticipates, albeit in terms that the limited human mind can grasp, the beatific vision and the glory of heaven. One of the wishes we express in our hymns of praise on Sunday is that those in heaven, God included, enjoy its glory: *Gloria in excelsis Deo/Glory to God in the highest*. There is no real dichotomy between our life here on earth and the glory that awaits us. From the moment we were baptised, we already enjoy through grace the life that we will enjoy in all its fulness in the next world and that life into which Jesus, risen and glorified, enjoys and shares with all who are already in heaven. And yet there is no invitation to luxuriate in the contemplation of future glory. Jesus left his disciples with work to be done, the kingdom of God needs to be proclaimed and the family of his disciples (the Church) needs to grow until the close of the age. And what makes the Ascension such a special and liberating feast is the fact that Jesus empowered us to proclaim the kingdom and we have come of age, the completion of Jesus' mission is up to us. Is it any wonder that the first reading presents us with the Apostles, the Virgin Mary and disciples, gathered in prayer – in circumstances not dissimilar from those in which most individuals and families in our parish community are experiencing in the current lockdown – for the grace and the gifts necessary to carry out this mission.

**First Reading (NT): Acts of the Apostles 1, 12 – 14:** The Apostles are listed by name and their authority thus over the nascent Church is highlighted by Luke in this the opening chapter of his account of the growth of Christianity in the first generation. It is also important to note (1) the key role of prayer in the life of the community and (2) its conviction that what was being asked of it was God's work and thus that without it being animated by God's Spirit it was to no avail.

**Second Reading (NT): 1 Peter 4, 13 – 16:** There is every reason to believe that by the time Peter wrote this letter to an early Christian community those who believed in Christ and had pledged their lives to him were the object of persecution. Peter distinguished between the punishment those who committed crime might legitimately expect and the sufferings that witnessing to Christ brought upon them. Of such persecution and suffering they should be proud.

**Gospel: John 17, 1 – 11:** This is an extract from the great priestly prayer of Jesus placed by the evangelist John at the Last Supper. It is amazing that this intimate prayer of Jesus to his Father should be recited so publicly as if it was his intention that his disciples should thus acquire an insight into the intimate life which bound Son to Father. Jesus affirms that his mission has been accomplished, the work he was given by the Father has been done. Aware that it would only be completed once the disciples carried on where he left off, he prays for them.
