Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A - Matthew): In the cathedral church of Monreale, high in the hills above Palermo, one can see one of the most magnificent depictions of Jesus as lord of all creation, as pancrator. Similar images are to be seen in many of the churches of the Orient, including one or two which the Turkish government is determined to turn into mosques. This early depiction of Jesus in Byzantine art and the Western art which came under Byzantine influence, is well grounded in the scriptures. We proclaim each Sunday our faith in a Jesus "through whom all things were created." And we also proclaim that his reign in heaven and on earth will never come to an end: cujus regni non erit finis. He has been placed on his heavenly throne by his Father and we are in awe of his majesty. And yet when on earth and on the only occasion he was confronted with the issue of his kingship and with his royal identity by Pontius Pilate during his passion, from a human point of view Jesus comes across as totally powerless. The image of Jesus with which we are most familiar is of his broken body on the cross. His kingdom will only be visible when he returns in glory at the close of the age to judge the living and the dead. This is a veiled warning to us not to turn too quickly to the state to fufill the Church's wishes. In today's gospel reading we see Jesus laying down a firm line between the kingdom of heaven and earthly kingdoms: render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's.

First Reading (OT): Isaiah 45, 1.4 – 6: The Persian king Cyrus is here an instrument of divine providence. God gives his blessings to Cyrus, he opens every door to him, he promotes his cause – an irony indeed because Cyrus does not know him. God acts in this way, taking the long view, to benefit his people Israel. God does not set out to make of Israel a great power equal to the pagan kingdoms of the Orient, kingdoms such as that of the Persian king Cyrus. Rather he turns world history to Israel's advantage, he uses the most powerful potentate of the day to come to Israel's help, and all of this illustrates how great his love is for the people of Israel.

Second Reading (NT): Thessalonians 1, 1 – 5: Paul has the experience of the young church at Thessalonica as a loving community. He analyses the quality of the members' love for one another. Faith expresses itself in deeds. He sees in their love a willingness to sacrifice for others, a love free of self-regard, a love which is willing to give generously. He also speaks of how steadfast their hope is, a hope which in all temptations and difficulties finds its realization in Jesus.

Gospel: Matthew 22, 15 - 21: Jesus is very often lured into a trap when his adversaries put before him a situation or pose a dilemma where coming down on either side could land him in trouble with the religious authorities or the State, or as the pharisees might have hoped, both. The clever way Jesus answered the question was to remain for many generations of Christian history the rule of thumb for dealing with one of the most contentious issues: the relationship between Church and State.
