**First Sunday of Advent (Year C – Luke):** Today a new liturgical year opens. The season of Advent begins. We are urged to be alert, to stand up, to set ourselves a goal and to muster the spiritual strength to pursue it. The opening antiphon on this Sunday is a prayer to God to enliven our spirits and energies, and to protect us against apprehension and fear. We have to face the possibility of failure, there may be enemies plotting against us. And yet this season is generally associated with good feelings. This is a time when the Church invites us to look forward, initially to the end of days and the second coming of the Lord, and then at a later stage to the annual celebration of the Nativity. The count-down to the latter feast is signalled by the lighting of the Advent candles on the wreath, one Sunday at a time. We should accept the challenge the Church puts before us and embrace this Advent invitation as best we can.

**First Reading (OT): Jeremiah 33, 14 – 16:** “The Lord will work”, this is a promise of the prophet Jeremiah. God is at work still in our world today even if he is not immediately visible. Jeremiah was indeed privileged to sense God at work in his own day and to experience God’s word so directly. Today he is passing on that message to me and to you. God continues to work in our world largely through what we do in his name. Honesty and integrity come about through me. What opportunities do my daily life offer for me to display integrity and honesty, truth and fair-play? The time leading up to Christmas is a time of giving. Honesty and fairness find their place in the way we treat other people.

**Second Reading (NT): 1 Thessalonians 3, 12 – 4, 2:** Paul casts himself as shepherd, teacher, father figure and coach in his letter to the early Christians of Thessalonica. He shares his great faith with others. His faith is a gift to them. He is very self-assured, certain that what he has taught them will help in their relationship with God. He is convinced of what he is doing. He is not displaying arrogance or pride. He is certain of his own Christian convictions, he encourages the community in Thessalonica to follow him and join him. Not only should they learn from him, they should also teach and encourage one another. It is only in that way that the Church can live right down to today.

**Gospel: Luke 21, 25 – 28. 34 – 36:** Jesus acknowledges that the end times will make people fearful. They will behold awesome sights. Yet he distinguishes between how the end time will strike humanity in general and how his disciples are to react to it. They are not to be fearful and are to greet those last days in such a way that they will take the others with them. The world in which we are living today AD 2021 causes most of us to be anxious: the pandemic, mounting concerns about climate change and its impact, conflict brewing between powerful states, some of whom possess nuclear weapons. That is reality for us today. There is no escaping fear nor, in our globalised world, is there any way of getting away from the forces that threaten us. The challenge to us this Advent is to allow that hope which strengthened generations past to give hope to us too so that we can help others.
